

Notes On Printing

THE PAPER: This limited edition is printed on handmade paper made by formerly incarcerated women in the People's Paper Co-op's Art and Advocacy Fellowship. Criminal records from legal clinics and public workshops were torn, pulped, and transformed into new sheets of handmade paper that act as blank slates for this collective vision for transformative justice. The People's Paper Co-op is an ongoing initiative of the Village of Arts & Humanities, in North Philadelphia.

THE PRINTERS: Each of these posters was hand printed on handmade paper by either the collaborating artists, or by the women in the People's Paper Co-op Art and Advocacy Fellowship.

THE ENVELOPE: This poster series is encased in an envelope printed and constructed by our amazing friends and collaborators at the Paper Machine print shop in New Orleans.

Using art to free Black mothers and caregivers while fighting to end cash bail

THE PROJECT: The PEOPLE'S PAPER CO-OP (PPC), is a women led, women focused, women powered art and advocacy project at the Village of Arts and Humanities in North Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The PPC looks to women in reentry as the leading criminal justice experts our society needs to hear from, and uses art to amplify their stories, dreams, and visions for a more just and free world.

Since the spring of 2018, the PPC has collaborated with the Philadelphia Community Bail Fund (PCBF) on their Mama's Day Bail Out campaign. The PPC has organized exhibitions, parades, press conferences, and events to raise awareness and funds for their campaign (more than \$85,000 has been raised through art sales) while sharing the stories and demands of formerly incarcerated women with tens of thousands of people across Philadelphia and beyond.

In the spring of 2020, amidst the Covid-19 pandemic, PPC Fellows (meeting virtually, and having only met in person twice!) created portraits and poetry that they shared with artists across the U.S. to collaboratively create the artwork in this portfolio. Both a limited, hand printed edition and digitally printed edition were created, and within a month, the art raised over \$44,000 to bring Black mamas and caregivers home to their families and communities, where they belong, in time for Mother's Day.

In the wake of George Floyd's murder by police officers in Minneapolis, MN, and the international uprising that followed, the posters were used to raise more than \$17,000 in 3 days to bail out protesters who were arrested in Philadelphia, PA.

Free is saying I love you, I miss you


Free is removing all the hurt and pair away.

Free is just breathing the fresh air, watching the moon and stars.



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





















I need to be free because...
